1 THE COURT: Good morning. 2 This is our regularly-scheduled status conference in 3 our Cause Number 3:12md2391 and Multi-District Litigation Cause 4 Number 2391, In Re: Biomet M2a Magnum Hip Implant Products Liability Litigation. 5 We are fewer in number. I understand there's some 6 weather issues that kept one anticipated participant from 7 8 getting here and another one that made the trip very difficult 9 for an anticipated participant who is here. And, again, I will not be 4 surprised if there was some necessary item left out of the order that we did on July 2nd, so don't hesitate to tell us if 5 6 there's some other aspect that you need covered. 7 The proposed order you already discussed. 8 I can address the pending motions overview. 9 Within the last 24 hours --10 (Telephone interruption.) 11 THE COURT: They usually are busy calling my house. The motion to modify future remand transfer orders 12 13 was ruled on yesterday. The spoliation motions in Bruton and 14 Babcock were ruled on yesterday. The motion to compel just 15 fell ripe, and, frankly --(Telephone interruption.) 16 17 **THE COURT:** -- we were focusing on the motion to modify and the spoliation motions and haven't really gotten too 18 far into it, but I will pledge to you, you will get a ruling 19 more than 24 hours before the next status conference. 20 21 Boy, we zipped through that. 22 Anything further from the Plaintiffs' standpoint that 23 you need to raise? 24 MR. WARD: Nothing from the Plaintiffs' standpoint. 25 **THE COURT:** Anything for the Defendant, Ms. Hanig?

Just on that pending motion to compel 1 MS. HANIG: 2 discovery. In the Annette Williams case, I know there is a 3 motion from the Plaintiff for hearing, so I'm not sure whether 4 you're going to --(Telephone interruption.) 5 MS. HANIG: I'm not whether the Court wants a hearing 6 7 or not, but wanted to point that out. 8 THE COURT: Yeah, I appreciate that. I saw that. 9 We're not far enough into it to know whether the hearing would be helpful. 10 11 Mr. Winter, anything to add? 12 MR. WINTER: No, Your Honor, other than apologies. 13 The weather just really got the best of getting out of New York 14 yesterday. 15 THE COURT: That's what Mr. Ward was explaining, 16 although he was able to get out and arrive at 3:00 a.m. in 17 Chicago. MR. WARD: Yes. But even though I don't like to 18 19 agree with my colleague, Mr. Winter, I was thinking about him while I was in that, the midst of everything going on, and I'm 20 21 surprised I got out, and I'm not surprised that he was not able 22 to. 23 THE COURT: What was the issue? 24 MR. WARD: Apparently, weather. It seemed as if it

was a regular rain to me, but there were a bunch of

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cancellations, and somehow or another I was able to make it 1 2 here. 3 THE COURT: Well, I appreciate the efforts to get 4 here and the yeoman effort of having been in a place where the planes would fly and getting here late. 5 Let's look at a time for our next status conference. 6 7 Assuming I get that discovery -- that motion to compel done 8 within the next 30 days, would 60 days be appropriate for a 9 status conference? It seems like things are moving fairly well. Obviously, if you need something before then, I'm here 10 11 for most of that time, anyway. Do you think we need it more 12 frequently or does 60 days sound like a good target? 13 MR. WARD: I think within 60 days should be fine. 14 THE COURT: Okay. Let's see what I've got. Wow. 15 I'm sharing a courtroom and trying to figure out how I can be the least intrusive. 16 How about 1:00 on Monday, October 7th? Would that 17 18 work for you? MR. WARD: Yes. Yes, it would for Plaintiff. 19 20 MS. HANIG: That should work, too, for Defendant, 21 depending on what Mr. Winter's calendar is. THE COURT: Mr. Winter, October 7 -- that's a 22 23 Monday -- at 1:00 work for you? 24 MR. WINTER: It will, Your Honor. Thank you. If I don't have a courtroom, we'll either 25 THE COURT:

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do it in a conference room or, if all is going along
